

The installation consists of 2 poles (recycled B150 Philanthropoles) linked by a canvas flag, and 6 poles from trees felled on the property. They are linked by barbed wire representing the role fences played in the Indigenous dispossession. Various settler artefacts, mostly from an old rubbish tip on the property, are attached to the fence. The poles have been painted by local Indigenous artists. They depict Indigenous culture both locally and in Indigenous nations where my family has historical connections. Flip the page to see art

Dundalli and the frontier wars

Dundalli was a local Aboriginal resistance leader and an appointed lawman who fought to protect his people and country, writes AUDIENNE BLYTH

when he was 35 years old
when he was captured, tried and
hanged in Brisbane on January 5,
1855. Dundalli's was the last public
hanging in Queensland.

nanging in Queenstand.

Dundalli was a Dalla man from the Sunshine Coast hinterland and renowned for his large size and strength. The elders had given him the task of leading the resistance against the white settlers who were huslly occupying traditional

Aboriginal land.

Loyalty to his own people and his culture made him a hero to Abortgines and an enemy of white settlers who were in awe of his physical fitness and fighting ability and feared an attack. For 12 years he avoided capture until finally he was arrested and publicly hanged.

The Brisbane frontier wars or "black wars" lasted from 1824 until 1865.

Aborigines employed guerrilla-type tactics against the incursion of the white settlers who were able to call on Native Police. There were reprisals and counterreprisals. Dundalli was blamed for many crimes against white settlers - spearing a shepherd at Durundur Station, an attack on the Pine River.

In particular he was blamed for the

The event was sponsored by the Beulah Community, a charity supporting volunteers to address local social justice issues. The service was followed by afternoon tea at the Greenhouse in Lindsay Rd and the opening of an installation to commemorate Dundalli in the Memorial Garden in Buderim Forest Reserve.

As you drive along Lindsay Road the eye-catching memorial can be seen on the roadside.





The film Wunya Ngulum, which is about sharing country and Indigenous heritage, was also launched. The film was produced locally and features local Indigenous talent. It was developed with the financial assistance of the Sunshine Coast Council and Buderim Anglican SAILS (a local social justice group that includes members of St Mark's).

St Mark's Reconciliation group, which facilitated the event, was very pleased with their first reconciliation event. The event provided the opportunity for dialogue between Indigenous and non-Indigenous community members, involved parish members working collaboratively on a reconciliation event and engaged passers-by from the broader community.

Everyone is welcome to come along and join in beautifying Buderim's iconic escarpment.








